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Information Sheet for Long-Term Future of Japan

- This century will witness the long, slow sunset of Japan's power, as its ageing and depopulating society drags the economy down with it
- There is a moderate danger before 2050 of a nationalistic war with China
- But Japan's greatest danger is depopulation, with its population likely to shrink dramatically from 128 million in 2010 to 86 million by 2060, losing 90 million citizens in 90 years between 2010-2100, a severe average depopulation rate of 1 million people every year
- The working force of Japan will shrink from 63.8% of the population in 2010 to 50% of the population by 2060
- Japan will become the most robotised society on earth with robots automating as many jobs as possible to compensate for its drastically shrinking workforce
- Japan will become the world's oldest society, with its mean age increasing from 45 years old in 2010 to 54.6 years old by 2060, while its family structures continue to weaken
- Japan may embrace isolationism in its foreign policy and fatalism in its worldview
- Japan will become increasingly green, conserving its environment beautifully while becoming a world leader in clean technologies
- After several decades of graceful decline, economic stagnation, population ageing and demographic shrinkage, a *much* smaller and older Japan will face colonisation by an Asian power in the years 2060-2100
- If the conquerors of Japan towards the end of this century inter-breed with the Japanese, it could mean an eventual vanishing of Japan within a generation or two of this conquest in the years 2100-2150
